From the Pastor's Desk

Dear Concordians,

In a couple of weeks you will gather at St. Mary's for ashes and hear the words "You are dust and to dust you shall return," Lent is a time for reorientation. The ashes placed on our foreheads mark us as creatures who depend for each breath on a God who is one who creates us in love and calls us and all creation good. The ashes call us to the recollection of our essential selves, who we are and our dependence upon the created world and on one another. We will confess boldly that we know ourselves to be part of the sad state of affairs in our world. We will refuse to simply pretend that we have nothing to do with the pain and turmoil experienced among people around the world and wrought even on the creation by our misuse and neglect as God entrusted stewards.



This is all to point us to the reality that when all of that is said and done, our God refuses to leave us in ashes, but waters us, nurtures us and brings us back to life. The paschal mystery- the life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ, which we celebrate each Sunday, but prepare ourselves to celebrate newly after these 40 days of Lent, gives us the audacity and boldness to speak directly to the death and mortality that claims us daily and give witness that "Death has been swallowed up in victory." We can proclaim this boldly and without fear, even as we know that we still live and love on this side of the grave.

This Lent must be a time to change, to grow deeper, and to engage more fully the faith that has claimed you. The traditional practices of these 40 days are fasting, prayer and almsgiving. Update those things as you see fit, but don't let this Lent pass you by.

Here are a few notes about our Lenten journey that we will take as a community:

First, a note that one of our greatest assets at Concordia is the long and deep ecumenical relationship that has been built between Concordia, St. Mary's, and Emanuel Lutheran. We will be enjoying the fruits of that relationship this Lent and Holy Week as we will walk together through this Lenten Journey. Like any journey, it is good to know that we do not walk alone.

<<<Pastoral Admonition Alert>>> Of course, I don't need to remind you that just because something is hosted at "another" church that does not give you a "get out of church pass." Rather, the fact that Emanuel and St. Mary's are offering hospitality means that you have a "duty" to show up and graciously receive Christ's welcome through the ministry of each congregation. Sure, parking is not as plentiful at Emanuel or St. Mary's. You don't like to drive at night. I need to catch up on Perry Mason episodes on Wednesday nights and Good Friday. Got it. In both cases, simply call the church office and we will do our best to arrange a ride for you, with door-to-door red cap service to any service. Mostly, as your pastor, I want you to experience how incredibly rich these worship services are.

Ash Wednesday

Lent begins on February 14 with the solemn day of fasting and penitence known as Ash Wednesday. We will join together with Emanuel at St. Mary's Episcopal Church, who will host joint the Ash Wednesday Eucharist with Imposition of Ashes this year with services at 12 noon and 7:30 p.m. Pr. Maria Hammons, interim at Emanuel will preach.

Lenten Sunday Worship

Each Sunday of Lent we will pray together the Great Litany (reprinted in this edition of the Chimes). This ancient prayer of the church is basically a deep and profound prayer for all of creation. It sums up the creed, the intercessions and all of our work as the church in a haunting and powerful chant. The great litany in the context of the Eucharist will be our touchstone throughout the Lenten Season as we prepare for the celebration of "The Three Days" and the renewal of baptismal promises at Easter.

Sunday Lenten Soup and Bread "Lunch and Study"

Please join us on four sundays in Lent following 10 a.m. worship when we will host a Soup and Bread Luncheon and Study for Concordia. We aim to be finished by 12:15 each week. The Rev. Seminarian Eric Heinrich, our field education student will lead two of the education sessions and Pr. Barclay will lead the other two. The luncheons begin on the 2nd Sunday of Lent, February 25th and continue on March 4, 11, and conclude on March 18.

Wednesday Supper and Study on "The Three Days"

A joint Wednesday evening program by St. Mary's, Emanuel and Concordia, hosted at Concordia Lutheran Church on the 5 Wednesdays during Lent (2/21, 2/28, 3/7, 3/14, 3/21). Supper at 6:30pm and Study from 7-8pm (Free childcare will be available) Three soups, one from each of the three parishes each Wednesday will be provided.

February 21- **An Immersive Experience of the Three Days, known as the Triduum.** We will hear, taste, touch, see, and smell the symbols of the three days as we begin to deepen our understanding of the importance of these three days of Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and the celebrations of Easter to our life and faith.

February 28- **Learning about Maundy Thursday.** Pr. Maria Hammons from Emanuel will lead us through the theology, scripture and traditions surrounding our celebration of Maundy Thursday, which will be hosted on March 29 at 7:30 at Emanuel Lutheran this year with Eucharist and Footwashing.

March 7- **Learning about Good Friday.** Rev. Ann Lovejoy Johnson rector at St. Mary's will teach about the theology, scripture and traditions surrounding Good Friday, which will be hosted on March 30 at St. Mary's.

March 14- **Learning about the Easter Vigil and Easter Celebrations.** Pr. Douglas Barclay from Concordia will lead us through the celebrations of the Easter Vigil, its scripture, readings, and traditions. The Easter Vigil will be hosted at Concordia on March 31 at 7:30. Easter Sunday services will be held at each of the three parishes, but all are welcome to attend anywhere.

March 21- **Three Days Wrap Up.** The Rev. Seminarian Eric Heinrich, member at Emanuel and field education student at Concordia will wrap up the teaching and review the three days as a whole. He will bring his unique perspective as a seminarian who has recently taken a course in worship and can help us use fresh eyes to engage these three days.

Dave's Tips for Reviewing a Budget

Picture yourself in the position of having to explain a budget with line after line of particulars. Here are my tips for doing so. This can be for any budget, large or small.

- 1) Start at the bottom. For most audiences, there's no need for suspense. It either balances or it doesn't. If not, it has a surplus or a deficit that you can explain. This is a helpful way to prepare the group right away, and for some it is all they really want to know.
- 2) Review all revenue and sources. It's important to indicate how the budget is being paid for and how. For some, it may give them further ways to participate. For others, it will illuminate other partners they may not have known about beforehand.
- 3) Summarize expense items to the extent possible and focus only on changes from the prior year. Expenses are primarily inbuilt costs or are formulaically derived, so there's less need to go into detail unless a sudden increase or decrease occurs.
- 4) Point out anything new and explain the reasoning behind it. Change can be difficult for some and you want to avoid hearing the phrase "You never told me that was in there."
- 5) Point out any outliers and explain. This could be a boost in utility rates or insurance premiums, or an agreement to do something differently such as buying instead of leasing, etc. Sometimes there may be an upfront cost that leads to later savings and it's good to point this out.
- 6) Stop after each segment of the budget to see if there are any questions.
- 7) Answer questions right away, or parking lot those that can't be answered immediately with a date on when you expect to get back to the questioner.
- 8) If no questions, move along.
- 9) If the budget has a surplus, say what will be done with it. This is the kind of problem you want to have.
- 10) If the budget has a deficit, indicate plans to make up the shortfall. If that's not well known, indicate tracking mechanisms and milestones when decisions will be made.

Hopefully this helps. Budgets are not always easy to talk about, so having a plan on how to review them really helps.
