# Advent / Christmas 2023



Dear Friends in Christ,

On the first Sunday in Advent we not only begin a new church year, we also begin readings in series B which primarily focus on the Gospel of Mark. Series A, which we just completed, focused on Matthew's Gospel. The point is that we now experience a somewhat different approach to the life and words of Jesus.

With these things in mind and in keeping with the appointed readings for the four Sunday in Advent, we are brought along on a journey which leads us to Christmas. ...and each Sunday has its own emphasis.

**Advent I** points us to Christ's future advent and the demands it places on us in waiting, watchfulness, and preparing for Christ's coming.

**Advent II** deals with the question of the delay of the second coming of Jesus, especially so in the second lesson. At the same time, the Gospel sees in John the Baptist the "voice of one crying in the wilderness: prepare the way of the lord, make his path straight…"

<u>Advent III</u> continues with the person of John the Baptist and his testimony of the coming of Christ, not only at Christmas, but also and especially at the end of time. In the meantime, the second lesson encourages faithful living between these two times of Christmas and Jesus as the Christ who will come in glory.

<u>Advent IV</u> sees God fulfilling the promise of the Old Testament in God's way and in God's time. Thus the annunciation and the Holy Spirit coming upon the Virgin Mary.

Finally, all this leads us to Christmas, the Word made flesh, God among us – small and vulnerable, in the person of a baby.

This is our journey in Advent and this journey yields the hope of humanity for a better future.

A Blessed Advent & Christmas to you all.

### **Transition Update**

On Sunday, November 12, Licensed Lay Minister Bea Santiago preached at our morning worship. She read the Gospel in Spanish (English was included in the bulletin). We also sang two hymns in Spanish, thanks to the leadership of Lucy Berrios Taveras who instructed us before we sang each hymn.

As we consider "radically redeveloping" and becoming a bilingual church, we felt that we needed to begin to introduce what that might "look like" in terms of worship. Including a few elements of Spanish into the worship was the first step to give Concordia members a "taste" of that.

There is a new supplement to the Evangelical Lutheran Worship (cranberry-colored hymnal in the pews) named "<u>All Creation Sings</u>". This includes two new settings of the liturgy. One of them is a <u>bilingual liturgy</u> (which is the same as our present liturgy) which has English on one side and Spanish on the other.

It is our plan to use this liturgy on <u>Sunday, January 21 at our 10:00 a.m. worship</u>. We have invited Pastor Cassandra Chavez to preside at this worship. Pr. Chavez, who is bilingual, serves on the Bishop's Staff as the Multicultural/Latine Specialist for the Synod. Further information will be forthcoming.

## **Highlights of October 2023 Treasurer's Report**

October revenue was 20% over the monthly budgeted amount resulting in the year-to-date revenue at +1%. Maintenance and Repairs expenses through October are almost double of the 2023 budgeted amount of \$7,000. Year-to-date, all other expenses are on target or below the budgeted amounts through October. Special funds (Legacy & Scholarship) experienced losses in October but year-to-date gains due to significant gains earlier in the year.

#### Peace to you!

By now you should have received, or will be receiving, a little love letter from me about Stewardship Sunday next week. In this year's stewardship program, We Are Called, we have focused on the gifts each of us brings to this congregation. Two weeks ago Nancy Lynn talked about gifts she's received, and she put together the poster in which many have written notes of who and what they are thankful for at Concordia.

I'm afraid to tell the property committee they're going to have to widen all the doors and windows to fit my big head thru based on the note someone wrote about me. So kind.

Each of us has stories and memories of people, events, and ministries conducted through Concordia that helped make them see the faith of our members and how their grace is revealed in helping others, when need be, even in difficult times, and often more so just because of that.

I personally have been excited to see the gifts of love given and collected for those families in need at Highland Park school. I'm also incredibly pleased that Concordia will be sponsoring Troop 123 of the Boy & Girl Scouts and Cub Scout Pack 47, which means the building will be in use for children and adolescents of these organizations, to find Concordia as a safe place to meet and do activities to earn their merit badges and awards.

I have been encouraged to be an associate member of Ministerio Nueva Creación. Yes, it's true, I go to two church services just about every week. And I like it. I also enjoy the events we do together. I'm hopeful for our futures together and feel the spirit is moving both congregations.

I originally joined the Stewardship Committee in 1992. Little did I know at the time it would be a life sentence! It does have its rewards. Please bring your commitment cards with you next week for our Stewardship Sunday service. We are all looking forward to Pastor Rolf's stemwinder of a Stewardship sermon. Rest assured, if you forget to bring it, we'll have some extra here for you to fill out that morning. Or you can drop it off or mail it in if you're unable to attend next week.

I'd also like to encourage you to sign up to give electronically. I do it and enjoy the convenience of it, but I understand that's not for everyone. If you have any questions about it, feel free to talk to me and I'll explain how it works.

As Christians, We Are Called to worship Jesus and share the good news with everyone we can. Your generous giving enables us to worship Jesus, here, in our spiritual home, which we keep very well. Enough Oil to Play the Long Game by Bea Luciano-Santiago Sermon based on The Parable of the 10 Virgins, Matthew 25:1-13 Sunday November 12<sup>th</sup>, 2023

Good morning, everyone! First, I would like to say that I'm a little nervous so bear with me. However, I'll make a deal with you. I promise to keep it quick if you promise to keep it loud. Amen! We should all be led by the holy spirit and for some of us that means shouting in praise when the spirit is speaking to us whether it be through music, word, or prayer. I often start my sermons off with prayer because prayer grounds and centers me and allows me to be present in HIS word. Please bow your head and close your eyes. Let us pray.

Oh, gracious and loving God, I know that our life with all of its demands can be stressful and overwhelming however we come to you today with open hearts that you may awaken us to your presence in our lives. Help us to be open to the many ways in which you keep calling out to us and sustaining us. We ask you to make our hearts and life ready to be of service to you. May the words of my lips and the meditations of my heart be pleasing to you always. In Jesus name. Amen

I can imagine that if someone who never opened the bible and opens it for the first time and lands on this text today that they might be very confused and full of many questions. I know that when I first read this years ago, I was confused as well even after I studied. It only really became clear to me during our bible study of Revelations where I was able to make sense of it. I know for sure that I wasn't the only one impacted by our Revelations bible study. Can I get an amen from our bible study group.

As I was preparing this sermon, I can't begin to tell you the number of times I prayed for clarity on how to preach on this parable. I went down a rabbit hole of google searches which included sermon writer, working preacher, living Lutheran, ELCA resources, the list goes on and on. During my week

google excursion I did learn a few things like for instance. Did you know that there are Twenty-three books in the New Testament that talk about the return of Jesus? Did you know that the Old Testament has a least 7 mentions of Christ return. And like many of them they put an emphasis on the certainty that Jesus is returning we just will never know the hour or the day. Which sucks for someone like me because I'm a control freak and I always need to know everything about everything about everything. Just ask Lucy.

The fact that I always need to know and control everything led me to ask myself one important question. What would I change if I knew the exact hour and the day Jesus was retuning? Well, this was a bad idea because knowing how my brain works, I immediately began to go down another rabbit hole. If I said I had nothing to change did that mean I was prepared and ready and was one of the wise? Or If I admitted that I had so many things I would change, did it mean I was one of the foolish and completely unprepared. Would I be scrambling at the last minute to get ready? Well like Alice in Wonderland I ended upgoing further down that rabbit hole lost and further away from where I began in starting this sermon let alone finishing it.

So, I did what I usually do in this moment I stopped, took a breath, said my prayers, and went to bed. Next morning, which was actually yesterday, I woke up and as always, I began my day in gratitude and thanked God for the very breath of life he had granted me and the opportunity to be better than the day before. I thanked him for the breath of the holy spirit that guides, leads, and sustains me.

And there it was, my aha moment. I didn't need google or any other website to find the answer that was there all along, although I think it helped a little. I found the answer where all Christ followers find them... in the daily conversations we have with Jesus that help us build our relationship with him. That's the place we go to be prepared. That's the place we go to fill our lamps with oil. In that moment in prayer, it dawned on me that I was the lamp, and the oil was Spirit of the living God, the holy spirit that was gifted to me and lives inside of me through the purest and most abundant love we will ever experience if we choose to.

That's the key phrase here isn't it? If we choose to! See God gave us free will because God did not want slaves or puppets on a string. No, God wanted authentic, genuine relationships based on trust and love. God wants us to choose the relationship with him. He does not want an arrangement, he wants true authentic love from us the same way he continues to give us.

We could all be here every Sunday sitting in the pews doing what we believe is the right thing to do, tithe, donate, volunteer etc. But if it's not authentic and we are just doing it because we think it will get us into the banquet hall then we are no different than the foolish who dressed up, showed up on time with their lamps and waited but were not prepared. They didn't have enough oil because they chose not to. They chose not to build an authentic relationship with Christ. They chose instead to take the wedding at face value. Remember the parable of the king who invited everyone to his son's wedding, no one accepted the invitation, so the king invited all the people good and bad from the streets and they all came to the wedding.

Do you remember the man who was one of the original invitees and what happened to him? He did not have the right wedding clothes on, and he was thrown out of the banquet hall. Yes, he accepted the invitation, yes, he showed up, but he didn't change who he was enough to belong at the wedding. He chose to go to the wedding banquet in his former dusty old clothes. He is the same as the foolish who chose not to have enough oil to play the long game. The true acceptance of a life with Jesus

means that we change, transform and when we do that our lamps will be filled with enough oil, the light of the holy spirit to sustain us through the good, the bad and the ugly times of life. All we have to do is play the long game like the wise virgins did. We have to first accept the invitation, change our old clothes into new ones, fill our lamps with enough oil through faith, prayer, service, love, and forgiveness. Patiently wait for Jesus' return without allowing the enemy to interfere by giving up, turning back, leaving early and not being prepared remembering God is always on time, it may not be our time, but He is always on time.

So, the past couple of weeks I have felt the oil of my lamp dissipating at an alarming rate. Overwhelmed by work, life's ups and downs, and everything in between, I found myself to be a bit detached and numb. That was until yesterday, where just like that Jesus sends me a gentle reminder of who I had become by choosing him and having his presence in my life. We had our women's group fall brunch and as wonderful as everything was from beginning to end there was one key moment that renewed my spirit and that was the prayer circle. All of these wonderful diverse group of women hand in hand gathered together in prayer. It filled my lamp with oil. As true as I stand her before I say with all that I am that the holy spirit was present front and center yesterday. And it truly was something to see and experience.

It's really easy to be among the foolish, the world outside and the enemy makes it very easy for us. It's a lot harder to be among the wise. But if we believe and I mean authentically and genuinely believe in our lord and savior and allow him to make the changes necessary for our old selves to die and our new selves to be born and renewed then we too can be like the wise prepared for his return. The oil in our lamps will allow us to love God and serve authentically in the way God wants and needs us to. But we have to choose, and we have to be authentic in our choice. Because it's not going to be easy.

During me google rabbit hole adventure, I found an article about Martin Luther and a sermon about the parable of the 10 virgins he preached in Erfurt on October 21, 1522, in this article the author mentioned an English translation of this sermon was completed in 2013 by Rev. Paul A. Rydecki from Emmanuel Lutheran Church, Las Cruces, New Mexico. I read the sermon and towards the end of the sermon there was the answer to my questions. Here is a quote from that sermon by Martin Luther that I want to leave you with:

"If God is for us (as I am certain that He is), who will do us harm? Faith is stronger than every foe. No one can extinguish our lamps. Therefore, let each one see to it that he has these two together: the oil, which is true faith and trust in Christ; and the lamps, the vessel, which is the outward service toward your neighbor. The whole Christian life consists in these two things: Believe God. Help your neighbor. The whole Gospel teaches this."

Be your God Loving Authentic self and your lamps will be filled with enough oil to play the long game. Amen

UConn Sports Museum Receives Varsity Sweater From Military Hero The letter sweater of John Winzler '42 (CLAS) is now on display at the J. Robert Donnelly Husky Heritage Sports Museum.

A former standout UConn student-athlete and an American military hero is now being honored in a special way as the country celebrates Veterans Day this weekend. The letter sweater of John Winzler '42 (CLAS) was recently presented by his family to the <u>J. Robert Donnelly Husky Heritage Sports Museum</u>, located in the Alumni House in Storrs, and is now on display.

A native of Manchester, Winzler was a three-sport athlete during his undergraduate years — playing basketball, baseball, and football. He was the basketball captain his senior year and was a two-time All-New England pick.


Following graduation, Winzler joined the Marines and became a first lieutenant with the Fifth Division, 28<sup>th</sup> Marines. That division was involved in the famous flag raising on the island of Iwo Jima. Winzler was wounded at Iwo Jima and, as his family understands it, doctors did

not want him to return to battle, but he insisted on returning to his division to lead them. The doctors relented and he did return to duty days later, but was killed in action on March 3, 1945.

Winzler is remembered on the Roll of Honor in the Alumni House for UConn graduates who have died in battle and also at The National Iwo Jima Memorial in New Britain.


His nephew Mark Winzler, also of Manchester, is his last close relative and contacted the school about donating the sweater, which was enthusiastically accepted.

The sweater is in perfect condition and had been kept in a cedar chest for decades. A ceremony was held in the museum to accept the gift and was attended by Mark Winzler and friends of his family. The Director of UConn's Veterans Affairs and Military Programs Alyssa Keller and outreach coordinator Emily Lugo were in attendance, along with Director of Men's Basketball Administration Paul Wettemann, baseball pitching coach Josh MacDonald, and baseball student-athletes Garrett Coe '24 (BUS), Luke Broadhurst, and Jake Studley, both graduate students.






