#### From Our Transition Pastor

June 2024

Dear Friends in Christ,

I am coming up dry. That is, I don't know what to write about for the June Chimes. I can't write about the election of a new Bishop for the New England Synod because, as of this writing, the Assembly hasn't taken place. Writing about summer vacations and renewal seem a bit tired and worn to me. And above all, commenting on the current state of the Church and even thinking about the global situation - well, even those kinds of things get tiresome after a while.

So where do I turn? Well, I turn to an unlikely place and that is the Boston Celtics. In case you don't know (and I can't imagine that you don't know, but just in case) the Celtic's are Boston's pro basketball team. They finished their season with the best win - loss record in the NBA this year and so far they have gone through their opponents like a hot knife through butter and at this moment they now stand poised to play for the Championship of the National Baseball Association (NBA). In their storied history they are tied with the Los Angeles Lakers for the greatest number of NBA Championships, each having 17, so this next series, should the Celtics win, would be the tie-breaker.

Now if you have read this article to this point, you may be wondering when I will get to the point. Hang in there! So the game with the Indiana Pacers was really exciting. With the series 3-0 in Boston's favor, the Indiana Pacers put the pedal to the medal and lead for most of the game but the final score was Boston 105 and Indiana 102 and at one point Indiana was up by 18 points.

So it was an incredible game, but not just because Boston won the series, but rather because of the post-game interviews with a number of players, some super stars and other incredible regular players who not only understood their roles but really stepped up to the plate (I know this is a basketball and not baseball – just saying) and got the job done. You know the saying: There is no "I" in team! Back to the post-game interviews with the usual questions such as "How do you feel about the game?" or "Where did you find the strength to persevere even though you were trailing for most of the game?" or "What does this win mean to you?". And on and on. But what I found really poignant was the first response from most, not all, but most of the players went something like this: "First I want to give thanks and praise to God," or "First I want to give glory to God," or "God was with me and so I praise Him." And then, after that, players would go on to answer the questions as best they could.

Maybe all this got my attention because of what I do, who I am, and what I believe. Maybe this got my attention because in the euphoria of the moment the answers to these questions could have easily began in a different way. But they didn't. They began with God.

So this, like so many other things in my life, may only be a game, but it is still refreshing and heartening to see and to hear that somehow and somewhere and for some, God is still a big part of the picture.

### **Transition Update**

During late April and May members of the Transition Team/Council visited four churches: **Manchester:** North United Methodist and Center Congregational; **Bolton:** St. George Episcopal; **East Hartford:** All Saints Episcopal

At the May Council meeting those who had attended worship etc. at the churches reported back to Council on their findings both in terms of worship, but also other information they had learned. (Note: Those who attended did not identify themselves as being from Concordia and just said they were visiting and most left right at the end of the liturgy so that they would not be peppered with questions.)

As a result of the discussions, the focus was to take the next step with North United Methodist and St. George's Episcopal. Bishop Hazelwood has been contacted. He has advised us to move ahead and when if we do meet, then he will contact the Bishops of the respective churches as a courtesy. A letter will now be sent to churches to talk about meeting together to talk.

Additionally, the Transition Team/Council expressed interest in visiting another church: St. Peter's Episcopal in South Windsor. This was done this past Sunday, June 2. Those attending will report out at the June 9 Council meeting.

#### Summary

April envelope and other funding was 24% below the monthly budgeted amount, however we are 17% above the year-to-date budgeted amount. Expenses were almost double the revenue due to quarterly insurance and elevator maintenance payments as well as over \$6,000 in building maintenance & repairs. Special funds (Thrivent Scholarship and Fidelity (Community Cares and Legacy) both realized losses in the month of April however due to the large amount of gains the last few months the funds still have year-to-date gains. An amount totaling \$8,800 was withdrawn from Fidelity for our MACC and GHIAA yearly benevolence.

With the summer months coming up, please remember to continue your regular giving even if you are away. Unfortunately bills do not take a vacation. Thank you.





The following sermon is based on John 17:6-19. It was delivered by Lucy Taveras in Spanish and by me in English to Ministerio Nueva Creación on Sunday, May  $12^{th}$ . I hope you enjoy it.

# Sermon title: Jesus Leaves the Laptop Behind By David Smith

In October of 1995, I took a vacation with some other members of Concordia, and we followed the steps of St. Paul through Greece, and we paid for an extension of the trip to go to Turkey and see Ephesus. It was a wonderful trip and experience for me, and it came at the perfect time. I had just completed a successful project and had yet to be assigned a new one, so I had no work business to occupy my mind while on this vacation. Everything was good. The night before the trip I recall praying to God in thanksgiving for being with me in my life and for helping me be in the position to even take this trip.

Prior to departing on any trip, it's important to make those last-minute preparations. You need to check the itinerary and flight reservations, make sure you set the alarm clock to wake up in plenty of time to reach the airport to meet your flight, finish packing your suitcase, and don't forget to bring your toiletries, and finally, say that last prayer for the well-being of your family while you're away, your friends, pets, and home, and for safe travels to your destination. This is essentially what Jesus was doing in his prayer to God before ascending to heaven.

Jesus' prayer is important because he is marking out for distinction his disciples for blessing by God, and protection by God, just as Jesus had protected them during his ministry.

The disciples followed Jesus because there was something about him that enabled them free to drop everything they were doing, and just leave with him and help him in his ministry. Jesus is praying for their protection because he knows those that persecuted him would also try to go after his disciples too. He is praising them before God's for the work they're to do delivering the Good News to others so recently achieved through Christ's taking the cross and resurrection.

I learned many things about St. Paul on that trip to Greece. How he lived, where he stayed, who he met, what happened to him, including imprisonment and miracles. It got me to think a lot about the sacrifices he made, the danger he put himself into, that I can relate to Christ's work and also to his disciples. Upon reading today's gospel, I couldn't help returning to that trip where I was free to roam around, see and experience things, and simply relax and enjoy life.

I particularly recall walking around Athens on a Wednesday afternoon, at this point, the trip was half over, and thinking I should really be at work right now. But I was glad I wasn't. I couldn't help to wonder how Jesus was feeling. Was he feeling the same and excited about his ascendancy, or was he worried about his disciples and leaving them, even though this was all predestined in accordance with the scriptures. I think Jesus felt a little of all of these things.

Jesus' prayer shows his love and devotion to the disciples. Their worship of Jesus and their passing along of the Good News is why we're here today. His prayers were his way of packing for the trip and leaving after completing a successful project, which is the absolute best way to travel. There's nothing worse than going on vacation and taking your work with you. Sadly, I have done that many times. So now whenever I take the retreats at Camp Calumet as part of the School of Lay Ministry, I always leave my work laptop behind.


