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Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton's Easter Message......

Mary anointed Jesus' feet with pure nard, this incredibly costly, precious substance. Then she dried his feet with her hair.

In the Gospel story in the last Sunday in Lent, we hear about Jesus visiting with his dear friends, Martha, Mary and Lazarus. This happened just after Jesus had raised Lazarus from the dead. And Mary was anointing Jesus' feet with pure nard, this incredibly costly, precious substance. And then she dried his feet with her hair. Nard is a very powerful, pungent substance, and the Gospel says the room was filled with the fragrance.

Now I did a little research on nard, and some people would describe the smell as being pungent or earthy, or musty, or musky or like feet. So it was an interesting choice that people had in those days. And they did two things with nard. One, they would use nard to anoint the bodies of the dead in order to offset the stench of death, which Jesus had only encountered with his friend Lazarus a few days before. And it was also used for kings as a sign of royalty because of the luxury of this whole thing.

Well, Jesus was himself, like us, like the first Adam, an earth creature – pungent and full of life, dense in this sense. And this earth creature was obedient to death, reversing the work of the first Adam, who disobeyed and brought sin into the world. And we've suffered the consequences. The chief consequence is death, separation from God.

And now Jesus, the new Adam, the new earth creature, he's anointed, he says to Mary, for his burial and so that he will be using this incredibly pungent substance, while at the same time being very clear that he is, in fact, part of this incarnation, this earth creature. But instead of it being oil put on him to remove the stench of death, it became the anointing of a royal king. Through the death and resurrection of Jesus, the usual cycle of life and death has been disrupted forever. Jesus' death and resurrection promises new life and brings us new life.

So far, it has been a strange Easter season. On Easter Sunday, we shared a magnificent celebration, accented by the wonderful music of a full choir, a brass quintet, a flute, and a much fuller congregation. It was a beautiful Easter Sunday in every way—rich and full—and the spirit of the risen Christ was palpable.

Then came the meeting on April 27th after church, in which those present voted to explore Holy Closure. Pastor Maria Hammons from the Bishop's staff guided us through what the process entailed, while Mark Winzler, President of Concordia's Church Council, reminded us of the benchmarks we had already adopted for ourselves and the realities these entail. Questions were asked and answered. There were periods of silence for both personal and corporate prayer. Then came the vote, and no matter how one voted on the matter of exploring Holy Closure, there were no true "winners" or "losers." It was difficult and sad for all.

Now, as a matter of faith—and not an effort to pull the "proverbial rabbit out of the hat"—it is more important than ever to remember that we are still in the Easter season according to the liturgical calendar. But more importantly, and more to the point, we as the community of Concordia Lutheran Church are always an Easter people—not simply because of the calendar, but because of faith. It is who we are and what we are, by Baptism and by faith in our risen Lord and Savior. This is the faith that gives us purpose in the present and hope for the future. And let us also remember: we have each other.

Dear Fellow Members of Concordia,

Yesterday, April 27, 2025, a Special Congregational Meeting was held whose purpose was to consider a motion for Concordia to explore the Holy Closure Process.

Before voting on the motion, Pastor Maria Hammons (*Associate to the Bishop*) reviewed with us that which had taken place at the last meeting: we could not come to consensus (*basically split down the middle*) on a Lutheran Church with which to explore merger. Having exhausted all other possibilities prompted the meeting yesterday to consider Holy Closure.

Realities about our **benchmarks** were shared:

- Worship Attendance: If it goes <u>below 35 on a rolling monthly basis</u>, we go immediately to holy closure (as merger was already eliminated). <u>There were two times in the last 6 weeks when the average was exactly only 35.</u>
- Finances: As of March 31, 2025, <u>\$3,100 which had been pledged, had not been received.</u> Additionally, those who do not pledge, but do contribute, <u>have given \$1,000 less in the first</u> <u>quarter of 2025 than in the first quarter of 2024</u>. This means that the \$4,100 we were anticipating has not been receive. If this continues, we would hit another benchmark: If at any point, we are behind \$15,000 in income, we move to holy closure (as merger was already eliminated).

Pastor Maria then explained that the vote yesterday was to "explore" meaning starting the work which leads to closing (takes majority to pass). There will be other congregation meetings in the future (which require a 2/3 vote to pass), for example, one of which will authorize the building to be put on the real estate market.

The vote was then taken (by paper ballot) on the following motion: Concordia's Congregation Council recommends to the congregation of Concordia Lutheran Church in

Manchester CT, to vote to explore the Holy Closure process, which will include discussion about Concordia's legacy, the sale of the church building and property, and final dissolution of Concordia.

> Results of the Voting: <u>YES- 34 NO- 10 ABSTAIN- 2</u> The motion passed.

As the congregation, at the February 23, 2025 semi-annual meeting, made a commitment for the Nursery School to be in operation for one more school year (September 2025- May 2026), as of now, the closing of Concordia will not take place for another year. **Therefore, until such time as we close (no specific date has yet been set)**, <u>Concordia remains open and ministry continues.</u>

With that as reality.....

- For those who pledged, you are urged and encouraged to continue to honor your 2025 pledges.
- For those who do not pledge but still contribute, you are urged and encouraged to continue to do so.

Pastor Maria will now come to meet with the Council and Transition Team to talk more concretely about next steps.

As has been the case throughout the transition process over the past 3 ½ years, you will be kept fully informed about all that lies before us.

Due to an extremely volatile market in March, the Legacy for Ministry and Community Cares lost all and them some of the gains realized in January. My Thoughts About Concordia's Future

After the March 23rd meeting, I am sure that we all have minds that are reeling and hearts that are heavy. We all have stories about how our life with Concordia began many years ago.

My journey with Concordia began in 1966, the first morning that I attended Eddie Kehl's youth group with my new boyfriend. I became a member of the church, eventually married that boyfriend, and had three children that were baptized here.

My time here pales in comparison to those of you who watched the church being built, and did the walk from Winter Street, or who began your Concordant life as small children. I can't begin to share your grief, but in a small way, I do understand.

In the late seventies, my family moved to Tolland. Soon afterward, Pastor Strand called and said that there was a new minister hoping to start a new Lutheran Church in Tolland and we might want to check it out.

So, on a cold snowy day I think in Spring, my family and I attended the first service of Peace Lutheran Church, presided by Pastor Joseph Ekerberg, in the cafeteria of Parker Elementary School. Over the alter was a figure of a large owl, the school team symbol. The church grew and eventually moved to an office building and then a bank.

In the beginning, the church was full of excitement, hope and joy in the promise of a bright future. Unfortunately, the church had been full of beautiful vision collapsed into bankruptcy and closed. I had been there from that first joyful service to the last very painful one twenty years later. Even after that relatively short time, the church had become a huge part of my life. Peace Lutheran closed in the fall, and for the first time since the 60's, I could not attend a Christmas Eve service. I felt lost. So, I have been through a church closing, though on a smaller scale.

All of us at Concordia know that we have been part of something special. We have a love, a fire, a strong belief in our mission as followers of God. Our years of being part of the Concordia family are a gift that cannot be taken from us.

We will all take those gifts with us to our future church home. We are seeds looking for a new soil. "*Bloom where you are planted*." Our light will come through to shine for others because we know what it is like to be a part of a giving, unified church family. We all have gifts to share. Pray, sing, believe. God will be with you wherever you go, because he is in your hearts. Please know, that my heart is with you also.

Although our Christian journey is uncertain at this time, there is a part of me that remembers the spirit and hope of that church that was just beginning. I pray that God will help us find our way to a new church home.

I also pray that a new group of people full of faith, energy, love will breathe new life into our church building that now lies mostly empty on weekdays. The songs and the prayers will be different, but there will also be children's laughter. My hope is that there will be an excitement for belief in God that will travel beyond the brick walls of the church, and that more lives will be touched with God's love and mercy.

Again, I pray that God will guide us and give us hope and courage for our journey. Sincerely, Jan Bellino

The School of Lay Ministry (SLM) is now accepting applications for the Fall 2025 entry cohort - information about the program and <u>the application form may be found here</u>. The SLM consists of a two year program - one year devoted to bible study and the other to theology and church history. This rotating curriculum allows new participants to join each fall. It is designed to educate and equip lay people for enhanced participation in congregational and synodical life through personal spiritual development, biblical enhancement, and life-long learning. Each year begins and ends with a retreat at Calumet (the Synod's outdoor ministry site in Freedom, New Hampshire) in September and May. Studies during the year take place in small study groups organized geographically. All registrations are due by July 31 and require a signature from your pastor and initial deposit toward tuition.

GHIAA 2025 INITIATIVES UPDATE

Immigrant Rights & Protections

- 70 GHIAA leaders submitted written testimony in support of House Bill 7212, which strengthens the existing Trust Act, placing legal limits on the extent to which CT resources can be used to collaborate with ICE. The bill received a favorable vote in the Judiciary Committee on April 8, and the version passed included many of the amendments we supported to strengthen this legislation. It will now move forward for consideration by the full legislature.
- Over 100 GHIAA leaders participated in an ICE preparedness training held on April 10. This training provided guidance on how our congregations and the other institutions with which we are in relationship can be prepared if and when ICE should show up in our facilities.

Fiscal Policy Reform

- Particularly in light of the devastating ongoing cuts to federal funding, it is essential that our state leaders create a budget that invests in community needs and is both humanly and financially responsible. Adjusting the fiscal roadblocks is a crucial step in this process.
- A community forum on fiscal policy reform was held at the Universalist Church of West Hartford on March 30 with Rep. Kate Farrar and GHIAA Executive Director Cori Mackey.
- GHIAA and CT For All teamed up to pack the house with over 500 people at Immanuel Congregational Church in Hartford on April 8 for "A Conversation on CT's Fiscal Roadblocks" with House Speaker Matt

Ritter. Our conversation was deeply impactful and helped to illuminate a path forward toward a moral budget for our state.

Just Cause Eviction Protections

- Now that House Bill 6889, which would expand Just Cause eviction protection to tenants of all ages and disability statuses, has passed through the Housing Committee, it can move on to the full House and Senate. GHIAA voices are strongly represented in the bill's Joint Favorable Report. Our next task is to make sure it is called for a vote by the full House and can move on to the Senate.
- We participated in a press conference with allied organizations at the Capitol on April 9.
- We are seeking support and co-sponsorship for this bill in ongoing constituent meetings with legislators.

Municipal Housing Action Teams (HAT)

• HAT teams are active in several towns, building relationships, engaging in training, and exercising power on a local level to achieve more affordable housing in our communities.

Combating Racial & Religious Hate

- 45 GHIAA leaders gathered on April 1 for session 2 of our "Broadening Understanding, Deepening Solidarity" (BUDS) spring series.
- Additional trainings will be scheduled around these themes in the summer and fall.




