# Holy Closure Update

## Real Estate

As indicated previously in the Chimes the 40 Pitkin Street Property was listed for sale with Colliers International in October, 2025. The agent, Keith Kumnick, has had a number of showings and there appear to be several interested parties. On the advice of Mr. Kumnick, specifics can't be provided yet, but he is pleased with the activity.

**Due to the activity and number of people that have toured the property as well as some of the press we have received, you may hear some rumors from friends, neighbors, fellow parishioners or see info about interested parties in the press or on-line. Please only believe what you hear directly from the Council/me! As soon as we are able to share with you, please know that we will!**

## Background Information for Sale Process:

- As it is not practical to get 12 Council members together with the Realtor for negotiation purposes each time it is needed, the Council designated a **Negotiating Team** consisting of Mark Winzler, David Smith, Susan Bourret, Carol Stoneman and Joel Baranowski.
- The Negotiating Team will provide the full Council with information throughout the process (always in Executive Session).
- **A sale requires approval by the congregation. When a sales agreement has been negotiated and recommended by the Council, it will be presented to the congregation for its approval at a Special Meeting in the future.**

Generally, here are the steps for the process ahead (which may be modified, if needed):

- Offers received from interested parties
- Offers reviewed
- Negotiations with one or more interested parties
- One offer is selected
- Non-binding *Letter of Intent* is drawn up and reviewed with attorneys (Real Estate and Concordia's Attorney)
- *Purchase and Sales Agreement* is drawn up by attorneys
- Council reviews agreement and votes to recommend buyer to the congregation.
- Special Congregation Meeting is held at which time the buyer is shared as well as the sales info. A two-thirds (2/3) vote of those present is required in order to approve the sale. (Note: Only the "identity" of the recommended buyer will be disclosed at this meeting. The other interested buyers are not revealed, nor will they be discussed in order to maintain their confidentiality.)

## Organ

While the organ is included with the sale of the building, the reality is that it has no value to the entity which purchases it. When we had an appraisal done mid-2025 of our building, our appraiser underscored, that it was not included in the appraisal for the reason noted. Many churches nowadays (even those which have an organ) are moving away from using it exclusively.

Wanting to try to find a “home” for the organ, those who presently tune and care for the organ, suggested we list the organ with the Organ Clearing House website. Contact was made. Pictures needed to be taken of all on the “inside” of the organ along with other specific information. We enlisted our present organ tuners to do this work and it has been completed.

In conversation with the Executive Director of the Organ Clearing House, the organ was has been listed for sale at \$35,000. (Of note, in order to move the organ out of the church and into a new home could cost the buyer \$100,000 or more!)

## Inventory of Property

Thanks to the dedication and diligence of the property-inventory team, the inventory of ALL items in the church building is close to completion.

The next step is to invite representatives from Lutheran Churches in CT to come to view what we have and what they might like to take back to their churches. This will take place on **Saturday, March 21**. Letters will soon be going out to them.

On **Saturday April 18**, area churches (non-Lutheran) and organizations will be invited to do the same.

On **Saturday, May 16**, there will be a Tag Sale for the community, including Concordia members who can purchase items for their personal use.

## Archives

Please visit Brandt Lounge where a number of items have been put out which people can take. These include pictures, albums and other memorabilia. There are also various candles and baskets and other things. (None of these have any “monetary value” and hence are available for anyone to take.

## March 15 Meeting with Pastor Maria

One of the very important items we have to consider as a congregation as part of the Holy Closure process is our “Legacy Giving”.

The word “Legacy” in this case, does not refer to Concordia’s Legacy Fund, but rather refers to our collective mission assets (from the sale of the building, all of our funds etc.) after Concordia closes and the property has been sold.

Pastor Maria will be leading us in this introductory presentation and discussion on this date. No final decisions will be made.

Members will be given a brochure at the semi-annual meeting on February 22 to help prepare for this meeting. (This will be mailed to those who will be unable to attend).

## **June 7- Celebration of Ministry Eucharist- 4:00 p.m.**

Meetings have been held with John Anderson and Richard Hicks to select and prepare the music for this liturgy. The Atrium Brass Quintet and Timpani will accompany the liturgy.

There has been communication/collaboration with former Pastors Douglas Barclay (who will preside) and JoAnn Post (who will preach). Richard has been arranging brass and timpani parts for hymns and other pieces. Rebekka Almond has been identifying choir anthems as possibilities. Former choir members will be invited back to sing.

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On Ash Wednesday we begin our forty-day journey toward Easter with a day of fasting and repentance.

Marking our foreheads with dust, we acknowledge that we die and return to the earth. At the same time, the dust traces the life-giving cross indelibly marked on our foreheads at baptism. While we journey through Lent to return to God, we have already been reconciled to God through Christ.

We humbly pray for God to make our hearts clean while we rejoice that “now is the day of salvation.” Returning to our baptismal call, we more intentionally bear the fruits of mercy and justice in the world.



## Season of Lent

“The Lenten Season begins on Ash Wednesday and lasts forty (40) days (excluding Sundays which are always feast days celebrating the resurrection). Lent- the word originally meant ‘spring’ - is to be understood as a time to reflect on Baptism and its basis in the death and resurrection of Jesus. Lent is, therefore, a time for rebirth and a renewal in preparation for the celebration of Easter. In the Gospels one finds a constant conjunction of cross and discipleship. The traditional color of Lent is purple, to suggest somberness and solemnity. Veils are draped over crosses throughout these days.” (*Manual on the Liturgy*- pages 24-25).

Lent may originally have followed Epiphany, just as Jesus’ sojourn in the wilderness followed immediately on his baptism, but it soon became firmly attached to Easter, as the principal occasion for baptism and for the reconciliation of those who had been excluded from the Church’s fellowship for apostasy or serious faults. This history explains the characteristic notes of Lent – self-examination, penitence, self-denial, study, and preparation for Easter, to which almsgiving has traditionally been added.

As the candidates for baptism were instructed in Christian faith, and as penitents prepared themselves, through fasting and penance, to be readmitted to communion, the whole Christian community was invited to join them in the process of study and repentance, the extension of which over forty days would remind them of the forty days that Jesus spent in the wilderness, being tested by Satan.

Ashes are an ancient sign of penitence; from the middle ages it became the custom to begin Lent by being marked in ash with the sign of the cross. The calculation of the forty days has varied considerably in Christian history. It is now usual in the West to count them continuously to the end of Holy Week (not including Sundays), so beginning Lent on the sixth Wednesday before Easter, Ash Wednesday. (*from Common Worship, Lent, Church of England*)
